



















42% of families rely on social services

PROGRAM IMPACT



- 97% of participating youth reported that they understand that education matters in the future they want.
- 95% of participating youth learned how to set goals for their future.
- 94% of participating youth have developed study habits that helped them be more successful in school.
- "My favorite part about this program was learning what I am capable of doing if I have a plan for life."
- "I learned to get the most important things done before I have fun."
- "I learned that I have what it takes to be successful."



GOOD CHARACTER & CITIZENSHIP

Sessions of leadership, moral reasoning & public speaking

992

- 99% of participating youth learned what it means to be a responsible young person.
- 99% of participating youth learned they are responsible for their decisions.
- 95% of participating youth developed skills to positively resolve conflicts.
- "I learned that my actions impact others and that I need to work on self-confidence and self-control."
- "I learned how to be a better leader and how to use leadership to better things."

- 96% of participating youth learned the importance of a healthy lifestyle, food and nutrition.
- 95% of participating youth learned more about nutrition and healthy eating.
- 94% of participating youth learned that taking care of their body now will help them stay healthier later on in life.
- "I learned that the choices I make about my health will affect me in the future."
- "I liked playing in the sports leagues."
- "One important thing I learned was to relax and keep calm."

Butte County Probation Department 2017 Program Audit Strengths:

- No youth is excluded from participation even when behavioral issues exist,
- Staff utilize surveys to receive pertinent feedback and adjust programming,
- Staff have good communication as evidenced by the consistency throughout the levels of staff,
- During their observations and interviews, it was clear that the staff are passionate about their work with the youth, committed to providing quality service, and demonstrated talent when working youth.




